"As he was drawing near—already on the way down the Mount of Olives—the whole multitude of his disciples began to rejoice and praise God with a loud voice for all the mighty works that they had seen, saying, "Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!" - Luke 19:37-38

A crowd is gathering. Children are shouting. Palm branches are waving. They're being rolled out like a red carpet to make way for the King. Everyone surrounds Jesus. Both those who know him and those who do not. He is the fulfillment of the ancient prophecies.

"See your king comes to you, righteous and victorious, lowly and riding on a donkey..." - Zechariah 9:9

Most people do not understand what kind of king Jesus is. Many expect a political and military leader who will free them from the tyranny of the Empire. But he doesn't come to play by their rules, he comes to establish something entirely new.

As Jesus rides in, he holds the bittersweet tension of what is and what is still to come. He knows the scorning and shame, but he rides that donkey anyway. He rides with an image of us in his heart.

Hosanna! Blessed is the King who comes ...







Imagine yourself in a final hour. What do you do? What do you say? Jesus prays. He chooses to pray on behalf of us.

He turns to a garden and he begs God for another way forward. For a moment, his humanity is at war with his divinity. But he knows the answer he hears is right because he prays with an image of us in his heart.

A disciple comes and gives Jesus a bitter kiss. He is marked. He is surrounded. He is arrested. He is betrayed.

Jesus, now in chains, is once again in front of a crowd. This time they are not waving palms at him, they are yelling 'crucify!'

He makes a shameful procession to Calvary. Nails to flesh, a mallet is beating Jesus to a cross. The blood streaks down the rugged wood as he stretches upward to catch an exhausted breath. His pain is unfathomable ... inhumane. He feels every bit of pain as to say to us "any pain you go through in this world, I have already been there."

Jesus battles to exhale his last few words. And in an unassuming moment, he releases three of the most powerful words into the world:

"It is Finished." - John 19:30





Jesus' body is wrapped in linen. A big stone is rolled in front of the tomb.

Everyone who once knew Jesus before he died, walks around today inhaling grief and exhaling confusion. Was anything he said or did true? What have we done to him?

The next day, the religious leaders ask Pilate to give an order for the tomb to be made extra secure. They say "we remember that while he was still alive that deceiver said 'After three days I will rise again.' So give the order for the tomb to be made secure until the third day. Otherwise, his disciples may come and steal the body and tell people that he has been raised from the dead." - Matthew 27:62-63

Slowly, Saturday turns to Sunday.

Heaven is patiently waiting. Earth is struck a moment it didn't expect: a violent earthquake. An Angel comes like lightning to roll back the stone of the tomb.

Mary Magdalene and the other Mary are at the tomb, they are confused. The angel says to the women:

"Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples" - Matthew 28:5-6

Friday's tragedy has become Sunday's triumph.
